# Caring for Your Child's Wound and Stitches

Your child has had an injury which has caused a break in the skin. The wound has been cleaned and treated to help it heal.



#### How do wounds heal?

A wound heals in 3 stages:

- Stage 1 In the first 4 to 6 days the wound appears red and swollen. This is because the blood supply to the area is increased to bring substances to the wound which are needed for healing.
- Stage 2 In this stage the tissue begins to re-build. This begins about the 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> day and lasts for about 2 to 3 weeks. At this stage the wound is strengthened and is not likely to open. It may appear as a purplish, irregular, raised scar.
- Stage 3 This stage can take months or even years. The scar gets whiter and changes in shape and size.

### How do I care for my child's stitches and/or wound?

The care of stitches and/or a wound depends on the type, extent, location and how the wound was treated. The care for your child's wound is as follows:

	Your child's wound requires <b>no stitches or bandage</b> . Keep it clean and dry.					
	Apply an antibiotic ointment such as to the wound 3 to 4 times a day for days.					
	Your child's wound has <b>steri-strips</b> on it to hold the edges together. Keep it clean and dry until the steri-strips fall off on their own.					
	Your child's wound was closed with a special "glue". Keep it clean and dry.					
	Your child's wound has <i>dissolvable stitches</i> . Keep it clean and dry for the next days.					
	Your child's wound has a <i>bandage</i> on it. Keep it clean and dry. If it gets soiled or wet, change it. To change the bandage:					
	<ol> <li>Remove soiled/wet bandage.</li> <li>Clean your hands.</li> <li>Clean the wound with a clean washcloth and clean soapy water. Avoid rubbing the wound. Gently pat it dry with a clean towel.</li> <li>Clean your hands again.</li> <li>Apply an antibiotic ointment if recommended.</li> <li>Cover the wound with a clean bandage.</li> <li>Keep the bandage clean and dry.</li> </ol>					
	Your child's wound has <i>stitches/staples</i> that need to be removed. Your child's stitches/staples should come out on:

### How do I know if the wound is getting infected?

Signs that your child's wound may be getting infected are:

- Fever
- Increased redness
- Increased pain
- Drainage
- Swelling at the site
